

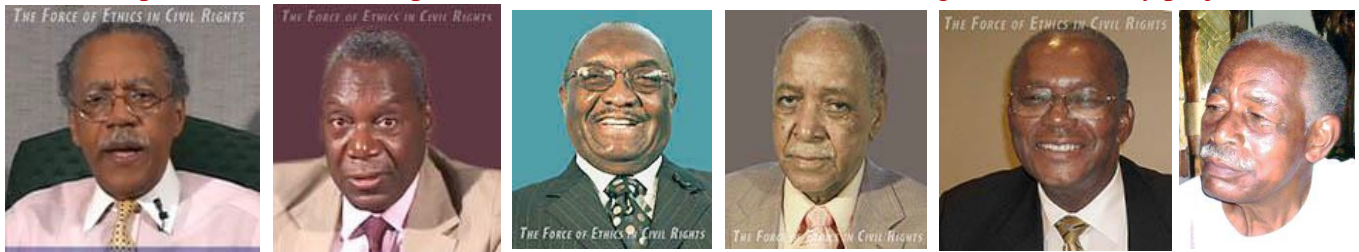
Notes for our trip to Memphis this April for MLK50, commemorating events that led to the tragic assassination of Dr. King.
